Understanding friendship in Year 4


In Year 4, the children started their new RE Topic about building bridges and how this links to the Sacrament of Reconciliation. They each started writing on their own side of the bridge before meeting in the middle. This is because they know that bridges need to be built and maintained from both sides. For our deeper learning question, they then thought about how and why we build a bridge with God and added that to their work. The children loved creating these friendship bridges together and can't wait to see what the rest of their topic brings!

24/7 mental health crisis line for children, young people, and families

Surrey have asked us to share this with our families:

A new 24/7 mental health crisis line for children, young people and their families and carers in Surrey has launched. The freephone number - 0800 9154644 – is available for children and young people up to the age of 18, including those with Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND).

The new crisis line provides emotional wellbeing support, advice, and signposting to a range of community services for children, young people and their families and carers who are in a mental health crisis. The number is available to those who are already receiving mental health services, and also for those who are not. No referral is needed.

The crisis line is staffed by a team of experienced, trained call handlers and mental health nurses. A key aim of the crisis line is to help support young people, carers and families within their own homes and in the community and, whenever possible, help avoid the need for children and young people to go to hospital in a crisis.

How to contact teachers

By doing this, office staff are often able to deal directly with your query or are able to direct and prioritise your message to make sure we help you as quickly as possible.

<u>Please help me to look after our teachers by not emailing them directly.</u> Teachers are unable to check emails during the school day and should not be receiving parent emails during their evenings or weekends.

Myself and/or a member of the leadership team are always on the gate at the beginning or end of the day and are also happy to talk, pass on messages or answer any queries you might have then. Thank you so much for helping me to look after our teachers – I really appreciate your support and understanding.

One space left in Year R for September 2021!

I'm really pleased to say that we've now only got one space left in our Reception class for September 2021. Most of the new parents who have come through the door have talked about knowing existing parents who have said lovely things about our school and how happy their children are at St Hugh so thank you so much! It's been a real community effort which is paying off. Job Vacancy - Kickstart scheme

We are looking for a Learning and Support Assistant and Play Worker. The role will involve supporting teachers in supervising pupils during lunchtime and in our wrap around care provision. Applicants should be responsible, enthusiastic and suitable to help teachers with the organisation and delivery of engaging activities for the pupils. Applicant must hold a minimum of a grade C in their GCSE maths and English and as this job is part of the government's Kickstart scheme, aimed at creating entry level/trainee opportunities for under 25s, applicants must be aged 16-25 and on Universal Credit. The successful candidate will receive guidance from teachers, safeguarding training, and a full DBS check.
