News at St Hughs

Dan Newman, who is part of the Mental Health team at the Xavier Trust, has been working with the children in Year 5 and Year 4 to help them to understand the dangers of Smartphones. The children will be delivering a presentation to parents to demonstrate their learning. Year 4 will be delivering their presentation on Friday 7th February 2.15pm - 3.15pm and Year 5 will be delivering their presentation on Friday 14th February 2.15pm - 3.15pm. We really hope you will be able to attend.



Why are we worried about smartphones?

When we first started giving smartphones to children, we didn't understand their impact. Now, there is a growing body of evidence linking smartphone use with an array of harms. Smartphones are correlated with anxiety, depression and loneliness. They are a gateway to pornography, cyberbullying, grooming, violent and extreme content. Research shows that smartphones affect academic performance, and many children show signs of behavioural addiction to their devices. Underpinning all these harms is one that is potentially the most significant of all. Smartphones are experience blockers, distracting children from engaging in the real world. The average UK 12-year-old now spends 29 hours a week — equivalent to a part-time job — on their smartphone. This leaves little time for the real world activities and relationships that enable us to learn the essential life skills needed for the transition to adulthood. It is not surprising that new research shows that the younger a child receives their first smartphone, the worse their mental health.

- What Ordinarily Available provision is and what this looks like in educational settings.
- Understanding a 'No to Assess' Educational Health Care Needs Assessment decision.
- Signposting to appropriate services for support, advice, and intervention.
- How to collaborate effectively with educational settings.

Year 3 - Saint Veronica

In English this week, Year 3 have been writing a diary entry from the perspective of Billy. We focused on including fronted adverbials at the beginning of our sentences to make them more exciting. In maths, the children have worked hard on their problem solving and have applied their reasoning to written word problems. In music, we have begun playing the glockenspiels in partners. Our current focus is the note 'E'. We have fantastic musicians in this class!

Year 4 – Saint Teresa of Calcutta

This week in Science, the Year 4 children have been identifying different types of teeth in humans and their functions. Children enjoyed using mirrors to take a closer look at their teeth and were able to recognise the different types of teeth in their mouths. Following on, children were tasked with the activity of creating their own set of teeth using playdoh and identified with labels which teeth were 'incisors', 'canines', 'pre molars' and 'molars'.

Our special focus spelling rule this week is: adding the suffix –ly.

For example: happily, angrily, cheekily, sleepily.

Orange words: heard, heart, history, imagine, perhaps, peculiar.













Year 5 - Saint Raphael

In RE this week, we explored how Jesus can be seen as the New Moses, drawing parallels between the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes. We discussed how both sets of teachings provide guidance for living a righteous life, with the Ten Commandments offering laws to follow and the Beatitudes presenting a more heart-centered approach, focusing on humility, mercy, and peace. By comparing these, we gained a deeper understanding of how Jesus fulfilled and expanded upon the laws given to Moses.

Our spelling rule this week is: Words with the s sound spelt sc For example: science, scene, scissors, descend

Year 6 - Saint Maximilian Kolbe

Last week, 15 of our Year 6 children had an unforgettable afternoon at Salesian Secondary School, where they took part in an exciting music workshop.
